FROM THE MEDICAL DIRECTOR'S DESK

Based on recently conducted Surveys, in India around 9.2million people are blind [Presenting Visual Acuity (PVA) < 3/60] and about 270 million people with vision < 6/60 need urgent eye care. Bihar is one of the worst affected states that need to ramp up the quality community eye care services to eliminate needless blindness.

For the past 14 years Akhand Jyoti Eye Hospitals is committed to providing comprehensive quality eye care to the rural people who are socially and economically marginalised and worst sufferers of not only eye problem but a gamut of other issues as well.

Community eye care is a much broader concept than organising a mere outreach camp. It has a qualitative impact on education and awareness about the eye's health, conducting various epidemiological and community-based research and survey, social marketing, better planning, and managing the sustainability of eye care.

Reaching the unreached through outreach camps is Akhand Jyoti's core strength. Presently though limited to the screening of visually blinding cataract, and eye screening programme for children at schools, we soon plan to incorporate

Diabetic Retinopathy (DR), Glaucoma and Retinopathy of Prematurity (ROP) screening as well.

For the broader coverage among the remote areas where there is a severe lack of accessibility, we shall soon be deploying trained optometrist manned and fully equipped Vision Vans.

A 350 Bedded Centre of Excellence (CoE) for eye care will soon be taking shape to further strengthen our high volume, high-quality, costeffective eye care programme, in addition to our ongoing expansion of Primary Vision Centres (PVC) and secondary centres.

We are rigorously working on our hospital-based data and switching on to Electronic Medical Records (EMR) now, which will help in a productive output of research, and continuous training and education programmes.

I am thankful to our entire team, hospital management, trust board, advisory board and respected donors for their tireless spirit and encouragement and timely support. I wish and pray for the health and spirit of the entire pre, present, and future human generations!





Everyone on the planet has the right to see and should not suffer due to unnecessary blindness, which is treatable, and the sight can be restored.

Yet it is estimated 15 million people in India are blind and live without sight.

That's nearly 1 out of 3 blind people in the world that live in India. Bihar – the most densely populated and the poorest state in India with the lowest GDP per capita is most affected. It is the worst hit with a backlog of 700,000 blind and 4.3 million visually impaired people. 100,000 additional people become blind every year due to ageing. Cataract is the primary cause of blindness which is easily treatable by a simple surgery, but more than half of the population does not have access to cataract surgery.

We're on a mission to change that.

With all our supporters by our side we believe we can eliminate this curable blindness from Bihar by 2026.

The rural girls we empower and train as professionally qualified optometrists under our "Football to Eyeball" programme help us achieve this.





Every person on Earth irrespective of gender deserves the right to equal opportunities in life.

Yet a forceful patriarchal society in Bihar discriminates women and throws open gaping issues in gender inequalities, shunting the growth of young women and girls.

Female literacy of Bihar is the lowest in India. The state of Bihar is in the bottom rungs both regarding Gender Related Development Index (GDI) and the Gender Empowerment Measure (GEM). The marginilised girl child often falls victim to early marriage, dowry, domestic violence, and rampant abuse.

But we're determined to change that.

With all our supporters by our side, we aspire to improve the life of underprivileged girls by negotiating opportunities for them.




THE "FOOTBALL TO EYEBALL" **PROGRAMME**

OUR VISION


To help eliminate curable blindness by providing in low-income geographies affordable, accessible, sustainable, quality curative and preventive eye care services and empower women to achieve this.

MISSION








NUMBER OF PATIENTS SCREENED






NUMBER OF EYE CAMPS HELD






NUMBER OF EYE SURGERIES PERFORMED






NUMBER OF EYEGLASSES DISPENSED






NUMBER OF COMMUNITY STAKEHOLDERS TRAINED TO SCREEN EYES OF CHILDREN






2 NEW VISION CENTRES LAUNCHED

LIVE WEBINAR



PAPER PRESENTATION AT VISION 2020 ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Akhand Jyoti Eye Hospital conducted a KAP (Knowledge Attitude Practice) **study on Eye** care supported by Orbis India in 2018.

Based on the findings, a paper presentation was done on "Children's eye health – a comparative study among household, medical/ para-medical and non-medical group in rural districts of Bihar" at Vision2020 Annual Conference held on June 8th and 9th 2019.



RAAB STUDY RAPID ASSESSMENT OF AVOIDABLE BLINDNESS

A Research paper titled - Prevalence and causes of avoidable blindness and visual impairment, including the prevalence of diabetic retinopathy in Siwan district of Bihar, India: A population-based survey was (RAAB Study) was published in Indian Journal of Ophthalmology - Jan 2020 edition.

The Rapid Assessment of Avoidable Blindness (RAAB) is a simple and rapid survey methodology that helps in generation of evidence on the magnitude and causes of visual impairment as well as on eye care services to plan towards universal eye health.


As in previous years, as part of our community efforts, we reached out during Diwali (festival of light) to neighbourhood villages and distributed sweets and chocolates to underprivileged families, and notebooks, pen, and pencils to the children to spread love and joy.

During the initial days of the COVID-19 pandemic many poor people including migrant labourers struggled for two square meals a day. A complete nationwide lockdown resulted in many poor people and daily wage earners losing their livelihood. At this crucial time Akhand Jyoti initiated "The Food Express - 2 Meals for a Family of 4" campaign distributing

28,912 food parcels to 4,880 underprivileged families,

containing - rice, wheat flour, flattened rice, jaggery, etc.





Ramya Nageswaran from Singapore, on the eve of 'World Sight Day 2019', started the 'Light A Life' online campaign and raised a whopping amount of USD 10,400 involving 72 kind hearted donors to help restore the sight of 208 poor people.



Sanjukta and Richard pledged their wedding in February 2019 to raise funds from wedding gifts to support cataract surgeries of underprivileged blind patients in Bihar. They have raised USD 5,946 to support 120 sight-restoring surgeries.



Jasleen Dhingra pledged her daughter's birthday and raised funds of USD 789 and gifted sight to 16 poor blind patients.

Sahir, our little friend from Singapore celebrated his 6th birthday as a 'No Gift' birthday and instead raised USD 1,250 to restore the sight of 25 poor patients who couldn't afford a treatment.

Antara, our 17-years-old friend from Singapore raised USD 714 by selling beautiful greetings cards with inspiring messages in her efforts to support surgeries of 14 poor people.
